Interviewer: What do you usually wear to work?

Interviewer: What do you usually wear to work?

Man 2: We don't have a dress code, so I'll wear jeans and a button-down, you know, a collared shirt or, you know, that's about it.

VOCABULARY

collar (noun) - the part of a shirt or jacket that goes around your neck

exception (noun) - something that is different from the rule or doesn't follow the usual way

flip-flops (noun) - a shoe with a strap that goes between your toes, often worn at the beach

maternity (adjective) - something made for mothers who are going to have a baby

sandal (noun) - a shoe that is open and has straps to hold it on your foot

slacks (noun) - nice, comfortable pants that are not jeans

sturdy (adjective) - something that is strong and won't break easily
